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My Brothers, welcome back from your vacations and other summer activities. I know many of you have or are going through the frenzy of start-up for the school year or sending your older children off to college. I certainly hope your relaxing summer provided enough of an energy boost to get through the stress of the school restart.

Speaking of restart, I've seen the emails about needing Keep Christ in Christmas supplies and Coats for Kids locations and partnering opportunities. I'm encouraged that councils are getting

ready to go out into the public sector to demonstrate our evangelization through action. I look forward to see other emails announcing dates for these and other events. One event I'm particularly interested in reading about is the Church Drive, whether traditional or Delta. Every activity in the community and in the Parish is a membership event, don't miss the chance to grow your council.

I want to repeat some points I made at the Organizational Meeting in June. I shared the goals I had made and some I had been given for this year. I am committed to growth in four areas; membership, charitable outreach, volunteer hours and family protection. Each of these areas come with a standard to determine success. So let me talk a bit about those standards.

Membership – The goal for us is 840 new knights. To date we've picked up 98 new knights, primarily through the online membership tool. People want to be knights! Some don't use computers or smart phones so we have to go out and meet them and ask them. And how do we meet them? Faith in Action programs – Christmas Cards, Tootsie Rolls, Coats for Kids, Special Olympics – and Church Drives.

Charitable outreach – What did your Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity show last year? That's your benchmark, the goal is 10% increase. How can you meet this goal? Increase your blood donations, visit the sick or infirmed, visit the homebound, drive people to Church or meetings, Increase your donations to RSVP, Boy Scouts, American Heritage Girls, and Special Olympics.

Volunteer Hours – What did your Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity show last year? Again, the goal is 10% increase. How? Increase the types and times of support to your sick and/or disabled members and their families, do errands, work Special Olympics events as escorts, judges, refreshment and nutrition workers, set up and clean up custodians or anything else that's needed. And what about in your Parish? Liturgical ministry, Religious Education teacher or aide, RCIA, grounds/garden maintainer, set up/tear down crew for the various information events. The opportunities are endless, just look around, someone needs your help. Family Protection – Insurance. Are you sure your family can survive your untimely catastrophic death or injury resulting in hospitalization and permanent institutional care facility residence? How would you know without talking with your council field agent? Don't interpret this paragraph as an advertisement for K of C Insurance. Understand this as my fraternal appeal that you be able to answer my question – Yes. As a Knight you are entitled to the services of the field agent whether or not you have a K of C policy. He is your Brother too. He has the same fraternal obligation to you as any other Brother. He can look at your policies and honestly evaluate the adequacy of your coverages and offer advice on how best to fill gaps or overlooked areas. This is Father McGivney's reason for starting our organization, keeping the family together. I know in 1882 the primary wage earner was the man and when he died more often than not the mother and children were turned out, separated, placed in homes or orphanages or at the mercy of society. He wanted to reverse that. Today we have working parents and double income families but I dare say the loss of one of those incomes would place a hardship on today's family. Can your family survive the loss of your wife and your children's mother? Make time to meet with an agent and mitigate the threats against your family's future.

So let's have a good month of doing the business of being Knights; extending a helping hand to those who need it, protecting the lives of those who can't do it alone, banding together to build a better society and sharing the joy of membership with every Catholic man we meet in our Parish, living complex, work environment and the neighborhood community.

We are Knights of Unity, on a journey of brotherly love enriching the lives of our members and families and the lives of those to whom we are offering the gift of membership.

A MESSSGE FROM THE STATE ADVOCATE



Brothers in Christ,

I would like to address another common issue that all councils face...**BRANDING**. We all use the name/emblem/logo in different ways to promote our various council activities and/or our charitable outreach. In the following article, we will explore when to use it and how it can be used.

Ordinary Fraternal Use

Supreme states in the Officer's Desk Reference, "The name and emblems of the Knights of Columbus are among its most valuable assets. For this reason, the Order

has registered them as trademarks. The registered and unregistered trademarks and service marks (collectively the "Marks") are intellectual properties that belongs to the Knights of Columbus. Proper use of the Order's Marks ...is one of the most important responsibilities of any Knights of Columbus officer. The Order's Marks do not belong to subordinate councils or other branches and divisions of Knights of Columbus. Home corporations, which are independent legal entities, may not use the Order's Marks under any circumstances. Similarly, individual members of Knights of Columbus may not use the Order's Marks, except in connection with approved activities of a Council or the Supreme Council."

The entire point behind using our brand is to do so under "Ordinary Fraternal Use". "Ordinary Fraternal Use" means the use of the Marks in connection with activities or programs approved by a Council to accomplish one or more of the following objectives:

- 1) Increase public recognition of the Order, consistent with the Catholic mission and identity of the Knights of Columbus;
- 2) Promote charitable, fundraising, or civic activity, consistent with the Catholic mission and identi ty of the Knights of Columbus;
- 3) Enhance the fraternal bond among members of a Council;
- 4) Cultivate goodwill among members of a Council and the parish(es) directly served by that Council

Some examples of "Ordinary Fraternal Use" would be:

- 1) Banners, flyers and other materials promoting fraternal or charitable events of the Council
- 2) Stationery (letterhead, envelopes, business cards, etc.)
- 3) Websites (and other social media sites like Facebook[®] or Twitter[®]) and apps providing information and education
- 4) Forms and Brochures
- 5) Newsletters
- 6) Annual reports

"Ordinary Fraternal Use" also means that a council is required to add its name, number and geographic location. This information should be located within close proximity to the Marks to make clear that the activity is sponsored by the Council, and not the Supreme Council. Our marks can only be used within a council's geographic region.

If you are unsure if the function/way you want to use the logo is defined under "Ordinary Fraternal Use", please do not hesitate to contact the State Deputy or myself with questions.

MASTER'S KNIGHTLY NEWS

The Marshals and I have had a busy couple of months as we completed installation of assembly officers. If it does not ring a bell with you as you are reading this article, it may be time to contact your Marshal or myself and schedule an installation of officers. It is a formality but it is a time for open lines of communication or just socializing with your Brother Sir Knights and their families.

Speaking of communication, I know that there are some of you that have questions as I have had them filter down to me from Supreme. It seems that when questions arise, it appears that calling or e-mailing, first the Faithful Navigator or then maybe a Marshal or even I as the Master is not thought of as an option and we call or e-mail, the Supreme Master. Just to be clear, 99% of the time,

one of your local leaders will have an answer and if he does not, he can get it for you rather quickly. Most of the questions recently have to do with the new uniform and old regalia. Over the past couple of years, as I have received information, I have summarized it in memo form or addressed it in the Knights Call. Memos from the VSM or Supreme have been distributed to the FN's we have listed and they have also been posted on the web-page for the 4th degree on the State website. Yet the same questions continue to be asked, mostly to Supreme, concerning being able to wear the old regalia, specifically if a long tenured Knight passes on and requests only the old regalia at his service. The Supreme answer is no more old regalia. Does it pose problems? Indeed it does and we have to work through them.

How and what can an assembly do to pay homage to a deceased Knight? First respectfully advise family members that the old regalia has been officially retired. It is no longer to be worn at any functions. If the family wishes an Honor Guard for funeral services, solicit assistance from the surrounding area assemblies. There are a number of assemblies in the Denver, Colorado Springs and northern area that have many members who have chosen to purchase the new uniform. The obvious difficulty is more with the times and days of events that preclude many being able to help but at least ask. If your assembly has only a few members with the new uniform being able to participate, utilize them to open and close the Honor Guard and in between, have 4th degree members dressed in a dark gray, dark blue, black suits or tuxedo along with social baldric. They may stand by the casket in respect of the Brother Knight. They would not wear a sword as that is for Honor Guard members in the Honor Guard uniform. If questions should arise, contact your Marshal or myself and we can provide you with direction. I have had requests for one time exceptions but for two reasons they are not granted. One, Supreme has directed no exceptions and two, if you grant one exception why not grant others for similar reasons. Bottom line, no exceptions are granted.

My focus for assemblies is to see them focus on the positive and promote programs. I have pushed this focus for quite some time, yet it seems we spend more time complaining on what we cannot do rather than what is available for us to do. A case in point is when at the end of last year, I provided information to assemblies with regard to statuary needed for the new VA hospital's Catholic chapel. This was a great opportunity to do a fund raiser at the assembly level for a great cause or at least write a check with assembly's existing funds. A few assemblies did just that and we were able to raise the funds necessary to accomplish the purchase. With that task accomplished, we returned to our old ways. Or at least that is how it seems as less than 30% of the state's assemblies submit the Civic Award paperwork listing 4 events accomplished during the year and less than 17% submit a To Be a Patriot Award application to brag on 1 program they accomplished during the year. Now maybe there is more activity and programming being completed but who knows about it and no one shares info.

There are two events coming up assemblies have an opportunity to participate in requiring little effort. The first was sent out to FN's concerning the 1st annual "In God We Trust" program that involves reaching out to veterans who have left the faith. The Archdiocese of Denver is sponsoring this event on Saturday, September 28, 2019 at the Colorado Freedom Memorial in Aurora. An outdoor mass will be celebrated by Bishop Rodriquez at noon followed by a lunch. The Knights have been asked to supply and help with the lunch of hot dogs, hamburgers and chips and being there to act as guides for the people attending. After mass, the Bishop will bless the memorial. The information is attached to this month's Knights Call in case you missed it. Let me know if you can help. Manpower and funds are needed.

The second event is the Donut Race in support of Special Olympics Colorado. This event takes only a donation to purchase a donut, half dozen donuts, baker's dozen donuts or as many as you want to race down the river located at the Gaylord Hotel. Of course they are not real donuts but the donation goes to a good cause and you have the opportunity to win one of 3 monetary prizes, 1st prize being \$5000. The details for that event were recently e-mailed as information by our State Deputy.

Do you need any other ideas. How about adopting a veteran for Christmas or Thanksgiving, collect new or gently used stuffed animals, donating them to local Emergency Service personnel or Victim Advocacy programs for children involved in accidents or traumatic incidents, Wreaths Across America and many other programs are available. Sir Knights, let us do what we were designed to do, be charitable in our lives helping others and doing so as a Catholic gentleman living our faith.

How the Commandant of Auschwitz Found God's Mercy

Not even an "animal" like Rudolf Höss is exempt from Christ's forgiveness, Polish nun says

hose who survived Auschwitz called the man in charge an "animal." Rudolf Höss presided over the extermination of some 2.5 million prisoners in the three years he was commandant of the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. Another half a million died there from disease and starvation. A year after his tenure came to an end, he returned to oversee the execution of 400,000 Hungarian Jews.

And yet even an "animal" such as he was not beyond the reach of God's mercy.

My wife and I learned about Höss when a young nun from Poland <u>spoke at our church</u>. I was taken aback when I first heard the telling, in part because I thought Sister Gaudia was speaking of Rudolf Hess, the deputy to Adolf Hilter. The names sound similar. But what happened to Höss, who held a less prominent position in the Third Reich, was perhaps more stunning.

The lecture was part of the parish's observance of the Jubilee Year of Mercy, declared by Pope Francis. Sister Gaudia and Sister Emmanuela, members of the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy — the congregation to which St. Faustina Kowalska belonged — are touring the United States, speaking about Christ's revelations to St. Faustina and the image and devotion of the Divine Mercy. Sister Gaudia, by the way, is part of the planning committee for World Youth Day 2016, which will take place in Krakow this summer.

Seventy or so years ago, Krakow, and all of Poland, was a very different place than it is today. Sister Gaudia spoke of Auschwitz, one of the Nazis' deadliest camps, with its extensive use of gas chambers and medical experimentation, set right in the heart of her country. One in six Jews killed in the Holocaust died there.

But the camp was not only for Jews. Catholics, such as Saints Maximilian Kolbe and Benedicta of the Cross (Edith Stein), were here as well.

"One day they took the whole community of Jesuits here," Sister Gaudia said. "Only the superior was not at home," so he was not captured. "When he came home, he was in such pain that he said, 'I need to be with my brothers."

Somehow, he snuck into the camp and searched for his brother Jesuits. The guards found him and took him to Höss. "They were totally convinced that he would simply kill him, without any questions," Sister Gaudia said. But he let him go, much to the guards' surprise.

After the war ended, Höss was captured, tried and convicted of crimes against humanity. He was sentenced to death, and the execution would be in Auschwitz, where he had worked diligently to implement Hitler's "final solution." He would be held in a prison in Wadowice (which, of course, was the birthplace of Karol Wojtyla, the future Pope John Paul II).

Höss was in great fear — not of death, but of prison, Sister Gaudia said. "He was totally convinced that the Polish guards would take revenge on him and he would be tortured as long as he was in prison, and that it would be unimaginable pain. How great was his surprise when the guards — men whose wives, daughters and sons were killed in Auschwitz, treated him well. He couldn't understand."

And that, she said, was the moment of his conversion. "They treated him mercifully," she said. "Mercy is the love we know we do not

deserve. He doesn't deserve their forgiveness, their goodness, their gentleness. And he received all that."

Höss was a cradle Catholic but had abandoned the faith in his youth. Now, facing his mortality at age 47, and perhaps encouraged by the guards' treatment, he asked for a priest. "He wanted to confess his sins before he died," Sister Gaudia said.





COATS FOR KIDS

A Higher Purpose

Provide warmth for deserving children during cold winter months. Councils across North America can purchase new winter coats for children in need at a discount and distribute them in their local communities.

Overview

Families struggling to make ends meet use their scarce resources to meet the most basic needs and cannot always afford the vital essential of a new winter coat. The goal of the Coats for Kids program is to ensure that no child in North America goes without a coat during the winter season. Through the dedication of councils across the United States and Canada, hundreds of thousands of new winter coats have been distributed to children since program inception.

Featured Program Requirements

Councils are required to distribute a specific number of coats. The requirements for each coat type are different and outlined in the table below. Councils must distribute the amount of coats shown in one of the lines of the table. Shipping cost are not included in these numbers. Report activity using the *Coats for Kids Report Form(#10675)*.

| Type of Coat | Coats in One Case | Cases Required to Satisfy Program | Total Coats (Coats Per Case * Cases Req.) |
|------------------------|----------------------|---|---|
| Youth Coat | 12 | 6 | 72 |
| Canadian Youth Coat | 12 | 4 | 48 |
| Teen Coat | 12 | 4 | 48 |
| Light Coat | 24 | 4 | 96 |

Action Steps

1. Contact the state council to inquire about assisting in a Coats for Kids event or coordinating one in your community.

2. Coats can be purchased through Supplies Online, the supply ordering portal available onOfficers On line in the United States and <u>www.knightsgear.ca</u> in Canada.

3. Prior to the Coats for Kids event, use the sample press release as a model to create and distribute a tailored release to local media.

4. Build public interest! Promote the Coats for Kids event in your parish and larger community through a variety of efforts:

- o Prominently display promotional posters
- o Bulletin announcements
- o Pulpit announcements
- o Posting on your council and parish website / social media pages

5. Invite the media to attend. (For publicity reasons, councils might also consider inviting local athletes, TV personnel, and the parish priest to the distribution, as well.)



August 26, 2019 a park was dedicated to James E. Harrison (1925-2010), Tuskegee Airman, Congressional Gold medalist, Commercial pilot, Community Leader and Brother Knight (KofC). James was a dedicated humanitarian, he was a community member who served in various capacities in the city of Lakewood, Colorado, HOA president, neighborhood Block Police captain with the city's Police Neighborhood Watch. James was also a Knight of Columbus who was active with several councils and Assemblies, he was a Sir Knight 4th degree the Patriotic degree which he exemplified to the highest degree.

The dedication was attended by James wife Margret, daughter Jeanette and grandson Ryan, other family and community members, Lakewood city council members and a very well-deserved large contingency of Brother Knights, Past State Deputies, District Deputy, Faithful Navigators, Past Grand Knights, Grand knights and fellow brothers from many councils and assemblies paying their respect to Brother James. Margret was presented with James sword which will be on display at the Knights of Columbus museum in New Haven, Ct.

James was a veteran who served in WWII with the famed Tuskegee Airmen nick named the "The Red Tails". Also paying their respects at the dedication was a representative from the Tuskegee Airmen Association and to add to this event was a Tuskegee airman who was the first "TOP GUN" won in 1949! This group of fighter pilots were so successful protecting our bombers that there were asked for specifically by bomber squadrons. He also served in Korea and Vietnam, he achieved the rank of Major before retiring.

In 2007 President Bush recognized James and the remaining Tuskegee Airman with the Congressional Gold Medal for their committed service to our country. After retiring from the military James also worked for United Airlines as a pilot and flight instructor. Our Brother James E. Harrison truly lived by the virtues of the Knights of Columbus, Charity, Unity, Fraternity and Patriotism. In Service to One, In Service to All. Vivat Jesus!


